

In Parliament—Session 1868.

Norwich Union Life Insurance Society.
(Alterations of Deed of Settlement; Confirmation of Bye-Laws; Provisions as to appointment of Directors, Trustees, and Auditors; Regulations as to Voting; and other Purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Norwich Union Life Insurance Society (hereinafter called "the Society") intend to apply to Parliament in the next session for leave to bring in a Bill and to pass an Act to effect the following objects, or some of them (that is to say):

To alter the Society's deed of settlement, bearing date the 1st day of July, 1808, in all or some of the respects hereinafter specified, and to confer on the Society such further or other powers, rights, and privileges as may be specified or referred to in the Bill.

To confirm all or some of the bye-laws made at meetings of the Society in the years 1858 and 1864, and to give due effect to such bye-laws.

To enable the Society, at any time or times, and from time to time, by special resolutions, as defined in the Bill, and in addition to the system of insurance prescribed by the deed of settlement and bye-laws, to authorise the formation of one or more new series of insurances upon the system of dividing the profits arising from its transactions among the holders of policies issued in any such series, in proportion to the premiums paid thereon, from the date of the preceding declaration of bonus, or upon such other terms and conditions as may be determined on by such special resolutions.

To make provision or to enable the Society, by resolution passed at a Special General Meeting and confirmed at a subsequent Special General Meeting, to make provision for placing the future management of the affairs of the Society under a Board of Directors, in lieu of the existing Court and Committee of Directors, and for regulating the number of such Directors, their qualification, remuneration, and mode of election.

To provide for the appointment of trustees of the Society, and to regulate the number of such trustees and the manner of their appointment.

To regulate the number of Auditors of the Society and to make provision as to their qualification and remuneration and the manner of their appointment.

To make provision with reference to the rights of members of the Society to vote at General Meetings, and to regulate the mode and scale of voting thereat.

To increase the amount for which the Society may grant insurances and annuities.

To alter, amend, extend, enlarge, and, if need be, to repeal all or some of the provisions of an Act passed in the 53rd year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to enable the Norwich Union Society for the Insurance of Lives and Survivorships to sue in the name of their Secretary, and to be sued in the names of their Directors, Treasurers, and Secretary."

To alter, vary, and extinguish all rights and privileges, if any, which would interfere with any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

And notice is further given, that printed copies of the proposed Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, on or before the 23rd day of December next.

Warrington Water.

(Amendment of Acts; Enlargement of Works; Additional Works; Purchase of Lands; Extension of Limits of Supply; Increase of Capital; Levying of Rates; Power to Supply Corporations and Local Bodies; and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session by the Warrington Waterworks Company for an Act to alter, amend, extend, enlarge, or repeal, in whole, or in part, the powers and provisions of "The Warrington Waterworks Act, 1855;" and such parts of an Act passed in the 9th and 10th years of the reign of her present Majesty, chapter 112, intituled, "An Act for the better supplying with water the town and borough of Warrington, or parts thereof, in the counties of Lancaster and Chester, and the townships of Latchford and Appleton, in the last-mentioned county," and of an Act passed in the 12th and 13th years of her present Majesty, chapter 5, intituled "An Act to authorize the Warrington Waterworks Company to raise a further sum of money," as are not repealed by the first-mentioned Act of 1855; and to grant further powers and provisions in lieu thereof.

And by the said intended Act powers will be sought to be conferred on the Warrington Waterworks Company, hereinafter called "The Company," for all or some of the following purposes, that is to say:—

To enable the Company to alter, extend, and enlarge their existing waterworks, and to make, repair, and maintain additional wells, reservoirs, aqueducts, mains, conduits, pipes, junctions, valves, syphons, stopcocks, filtering beds, engines, pumps, tanks, and other works and conveniences connected therewith; and particularly to make and maintain the works following, or some or one of them, or some part or parts thereof respectively, with all proper and necessary approaches, works, and conveniences connected therewith, respectively, that is to say:—

1. A well, or wells, shaft, tunnels, boreholes, and pumping station, to be constructed in a field, called or known by the name of The New Cooper's Field, belonging to the Rev. Frank George Hopwood, as rector of Winwick, and in the occupation of Thomas Smith, situate on the westerly side of a lane or road, called Back-lane, in Winwick aforesaid, and at a distance of eleven chains, or thereabouts, from the southerly end or junction of the said lane or road with a lane or road leading from the village of Winwick, towards the township of Southworth-with-Croft.

2. A reservoir, to be formed, partly by excavation, and partly by embankment, to be constructed in a field on the northerly side of the said field called The New Cooper's Field, called or known by the name of The Further Rough Field, belonging to the said Rev. Frank George Hopwood, as rector of Winwick, aforesaid, and in the occupation of Thomas Pollitt.

3. A line of pipes, or conduit, commencing at the said intended pumping station, in the field first described, and passing therefrom into the reservoir, in the field last described.

4. A line of pipes, or conduit, commencing at the said reservoir, passing the said pumping station, thence along Back-lane aforesaid, and across the said lane leading from Winwick village towards Southworth-with-Croft, thence along and across several fields or pieces of land, lying to the east of the said village of Winwick, and of a cottage called Broad Oak Cottage, to the turnpike road leading from Warrington to Wigan, and thence along the said turnpike road to, and ter-
